

San'indo road was a major highway connecting San'in area and Kyoto, most of which overlaps today's Route 9. It stretches over Masuda for 25 km from Northeast to Southwest, some parts still show the traces of old pavements 6 of those parts, 7.0km altogether, was selected as one of the "100 Historical Paths" in 2019, Along the San' indo road, there were post towns, inspection points, ferry terminals etc., which means it provides a pleasant experience not only for outdoor activity enthusiasts but for history lovers. It is strongly advised to plan ahead though. Access to toilets and convenience stores are scarce except for the city centre.

A Kamate-Yasuda

Kamate Pass area (A3-13) has stone-paved area and a walking event is annually held by a local community. The pass was known as perilous because of the long and steep slopes, but the view from the peak is magnificent. Kidoato (A17) to Rokusaito (A18) is an unpaved ancient road, but undergrowth can be dense.

Shikada Pass (A20) also has old looks.


There are remains of a port town around IR Tsuda station. They are off from the original San'indo route, but worth to break your journey.



3 Yasuda-Masuda-Nishi-Masuda

3 parts, Futaba (B3) to Taovama (B4), Ogihara barrier site (B12) and Hidarigayama to Mataga, are particularly recommended for a walk because of the view with old pavements. This area also has the remains of the battle of Sekishu border at the Second Choshu expedition (1866), which the Mori clan of Yamaguchi fought against the Tokugawa Shogunate, Central Masuda area (B5 - 7) has many old temples and shrines, one of which was built about 650 years ago...

There is a rustic onsen facility (B10) in Tada area. Southbound way from it goes into mountain path with no stores and toilets.



C Nishi-Masuda

Former post town Yokota (C6) still has some traces of its historic row of houses.

Funabashi (C5) literally means a "boat-bridge". Twice in history they had boats lining up so that people can walk across the stream for a special occasion.

Kanda area (C12) has some watercourses.
